Happy 10th Anniversary Jodi!

December 10, 2013 was a great day for the Cashiers-Highlands Humane Society, because that's the day Jodi Henkel started as a kennel technician. Celebrating her 10th anniversary with CHHS this year, Jodi is now our Assistant Manager. She is also founder and director of our immensely popular Critter Camp program.

As a lifelong animal advocate, Jodi joined our team as she was beginning her junior year at Western Carolina University. We immediately realized what a compassionate and dedicated professional Jodi was, and we were happy to work around her demanding college schedule. Upon graduation in 2015, Jodi joined Team CHHS full-time. As Assistant Manager, Jodi is responsible for scheduling and supervising the Animal Care Specialists on our staff who take care of an average of 120 animals on a daily basis. But as in any workplace, there are illnesses and planned days off, and Jodi never hesitates to fill in to help feed the shelter pets, administer medicines and preventatives, answer phones, and transport animals on our weekly "vet runs" for routine and urgent care.

Jodi is oftentimes the first point of contact for our multiple community outreach programs and to help initiate new volunteers. Speaking of community outreach, Jodi envisioned, developed and directed something in 2019 that was literally life-changing for the children in our community.

Jodi created Critter Camp. For the past four years under Jodi's leadership, elementary school-age children have experienced a week-long summer day camp at CHHS to learn about responsible pet ownership, humane education, first-hand interaction with animals of multiple species and the

endangered habitat that we all share. Jodi has a dream that someday, with more resources, Critter Camp can be all summer long and expanded to more age groups.

"Teaching children and seeing their enthusiasm for learning about animals is incredibly rewarding," says Jodi. "And just as rewarding to me is our rescue work where we first find animals at their very worst, and then we find for them the very best of happy endings."

There have been many other rewarding moments, too. Like serving on the front lines of puppy mill raids and hoarding cases. And being the primary caregiver for animals like Mizuno, a tiny abandoned kitten bottle-fed by Jodi who became the unofficial mascot for the Blue Ridge high school volleyball team, traveling to all the games, the practices, and even on all the bus rides. And of course there is Abby, who Jodi adopted from CHHS in 2019 and as she lovingly describes as "the best kind of dog, a mutt of all mutts".

Rewarding moments would not be complete without mentioning Silas, Jodi's first child, born in 2021. Bringing a child into this world is challenging enough, without the joyous event happening in the midst of the health care crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"CHHS was very supportive while I was out on maternity leave," says Jodi. "And when I came back, I realized that CHHS is also a great place to work while raising a child. We're not co-workers here, we're family. We are a work family that cares about each other's personal family."

Ten years. Jodi is the second member of our management team to celebrate a 10th anniversary at CHHS. Two more team members will celebrate their 10th in 2024. That speaks volumes to the strength and stability of the organization dedicated to serving as the voice for the voiceless on the Highlands-Cashiers plateau.

"I can't help but be excited for the next decade at CHHS," says Jodi. "I have seen so much positive growth and change in the past 10 years that it's going to be hard to top. But I know with the best team here at CHHS and the most caring animal loving community behind us, we will continue to do wonderful things!"

CHHS Supports Our Local Law Enforcement K-9's


In 2022, we helped raise the funds for Jackson County Sheriff's K-9 Officer Scout, who needed a new "retirement doghouse". We love Scout, who for years was a star attraction at our summer Critter Camp program.


This year, we helped another recently retired Jackson County Sheriff's K-9, not with his house... but with his life.

Axe retired this past January. Many times in his career, this K9 Deputy specializing in drug detection alerted officers to major narcotics seizures, removing bad guys from our streets and making our neighborhoods safer.

Axe was more than just a trained law enforcement officer protecting our community. He was, and is, a beloved member of the family of Investigator Ridge Parris.

Ridge contacted CHHS and shared an urgent heartbreaking situation. Axe was at the emergency veterinary hospital. He hadn't eaten for days and had lost a tremendous amount of weight. An ultrasound showed a significant intestinal blockage, and immediate surgery was





But that wasn't an option to CHHS.

Within minutes of getting the plea for help from Investigator Parris, the Cashiers-Highlands Humane Society gave the green light for the surgery and paid 100% of the bill. Axe completely recovered and is now back to normal as a beloved family member and a respected retired law enforcement officer.

New Volunteer Dog Walking Trail

For decades, our beloved dog walking volunteers have visited CHHS to give our shelter pups an extra opportunity for exercise and socialization. The most common walking route used was down our main entrance road, then across Highway 64 East to the gravel road that winded its way to the Sapphire Valley Resort. In recent years, our summer Critter Campers have also used this route during their Friday "graduation hikes".

A pedestrian crossing Highway 64 with a leashed dog in tow has become more and more treacherous over the years, especially from motorists traveling westward around the blind curve from Lonesome Valley. We had an idea to solve this challenge, and at the same time utilize the pristine natural resources on our campus in a responsible, sustainable way.

This past winter our awesome dog walking volunteer Kim Allen initiated discussions with our great neighbors, the Friends of Panthertown Valley. The Panthertown folks lent us their expertise and helped map out a trail on the northwest section of our property. It was a perfect solution that provides a safe and beautiful environment to hike for our community volunteers and our shelter dogs.

In September ground was broken on the new volunteer dog walking trail and opened soon thereafter. The first phase of the trail is an approximately 1/4 mile loop, and a volunteer can walk a shelter dog around the loop in about 10-15 minutes. Additional spurs are envisioned for future phases, along with a peaceful and serene resting area with a "rainbow bridge" theme. Over the winter and spring we will be adding signage, a water station, dog waste station and some benches. An official grand opening of the new trail will take place in Summer 2024.

From the Executive Director

I will never forget the look on that car salesman's face in Fort Myers. His name was Louis. He was a really nice guy. He had sold me a Mustang convertible once before.

That Mustang was a lot of fun. Kodi, my "heart dog" Husky, was happy to ride in that little back seat, as long as the top was down. Hemi, the baby of the Husky pack, always insisted on riding shotgun.

And then came Max.

I went back to Louis, and I said I wanted some kind of big ol' school bus SUV. I wasn't picky.

He had a used 2005 Yukon XL on the lot. "It's got three rows of seats!" he exclaimed.

"Can they be removed?" I asked.

Blank stare.

"The back row seat can," Louis said, after regaining his car salesman composure.

"Great, let's remove it. How about the middle seats?" I responded.

Blank stare.

After another awkward pause, Louis said: "They can't be removed but they can fold down."

"Great, let's fold them down," I said.

And thus, the Huskymobile was born. The only GMC Yukon XL that has just two seats for human passengers.

The Huskymobile brought my boys and me to our forever home at the Cashiers-Highlands Humane Society in the spring of 2012. Over the years, the Huskies have not only enjoyed adventures all across the plateau, the vehicle that brought them here has also been called into service to assist in CHHS animal rescue, most recently last year in South Carolina.

And sometimes the Huskymobile has also been where we said goodbye. When we didn't want to move him off the stretcher, Dr. Emily crawled into the back of the Huskymobile one Saturday afternoon to help me say goodbye to Grandpa Jones.

After all my senior Huskies forged a path ahead of me to the Rainbow Bridge over the years, last year after much thought, and not just a small amount of well-meaning coercion from loved ones, I decided to adopt who I referred to as my "bucket list Husky puppy". Just one more Husky, I rationalized with my inner self, before I kick the bucket. And maybe this time, for the first time, a Husky with no "story", no issues, just a normal puppy, I thought.

I truly believe that is when God laughs.

Her name is Oakley. My husky puppy (the offspring of a puppy mill survivor) developed cataracts and was blind by the age of 11 months. Yes, a puppy can get cataracts. The last few months have been difficult. Oakley and I have been putting a lot of miles on the Huskymobile going to Upstate Vet. Last month was surgery day. On the drive down to Greenville I thought of this quote from the Shawshank Redemption.

"I find I'm so excited that I can barely sit still or hold a thought in my head. I think it's the excitement only a free man can feel. A free man at a start of a long journey whose conclusion is uncertain."



Change the word "man" to "dog" and I wondered if that is what Oakley felt.

I think of all the lifesaving and lifechanging trips the Huskymobile has ever made, but I believe this journey Oakley and I made together was the greatest one yet. The surgery was successful.

Oakley can see.

So just as Mitch taught us earlier this year, and Oakley reminded me most recently, these three words have been a guiding principle throughout a very challenging 2023:

"Never Give Up."
